WORKSHOP DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

The urban landscape in Muharraq, along with other cities in Bahrain, is changing dramatically. Ranging from large scale land reclamations paving the way for major developments to smaller historical restoration projects attempting to preserve the cultural heritage of the place, there can be no question that Muharraq is undergoing an unprecedented transformation.

The aim of the workshop is to shed light on Muharraq at the turn of the 21st century, a city once described as an archetypal Islamic town, reflecting on the transformation of the urban landscape and its impact on people's lives.

Participants will be encouraged to venture beyond the obvious interpretation of Muharraq as it was once known, and produce innovative projects that paint the true color of the place in today's modern age. Participants will need to investigate the social fabric of the place and come up with projects that add a fresh perspective to the understanding of a city that many of us enjoy by simply wandering along its alleyways, admiring its traditional architecture, enjoying its coffee shops and old souks. Where does all that stand now amidst the transformations that are happening all around, with three bridges connecting the city into the mainland, how this is affecting people's daily lives and how much of the romantic notion of the place is still preserved?

The output of the workshop is expected to be a thought provoking visual interpretation that offers the viewer a new perspective on the emerging culture resulting from today's fast changing world and globalised context.
